ST. MATTHEW'S LAND ACKNOWLEDGEMENT

St. Matthew's Episcopal Church sits on the traditional homelands of the people of the Council of Three Fires: the Ojibwe, Potawatomi, and Odawa nations. This land was also a place of travel and trade to many other tribes, including the Menominee, Ho-Chunk, and Miami tribes. These Native Peoples were forced off their lands with the Second Treaty of Prairie du Chien in 1829. After a series of land transfers, St. Matthew's acquired its current site within this territory in 1906. Today, Cook County is home to tens of thousands of Native Americans from many tribes. We acknowledge and respect our Indigenous neighbors, as we strive to be good stewards of this Native land.

COVID GUIDELINES

Our Covid protocols have eased, but the number of cases has begun to rise again. Please be attentive to the following:

 - Wine at communion: Communion ministers will be off to the side offering a chalice and an intinction bowl. We ask you decide either to drink from the chalice, instinct the wafer (dip the wafer into the wine) using the bowl, or forgo the wine.





A READING FROM THE FIRST LETTER OF PAUL TO THE CORINTHIANS (8:1-13)

Now concerning food sacrificed to idols: we know that "all of us possess knowledge." Knowledge puffs up, but love builds up. Anyone who claims to know something does not yet have the necessary knowledge; but anyone who loves God is known by him.

Hence, as to the eating of food offered to idols, we know that "no idol in the world really exists," and that "there is no God but one." Indeed, even though there may be so-called gods in heaven or on earth — as in fact there are many gods and many lords — yet for us there is one God, the Father, from whom are all things and for whom we exist, and one Lord, Jesus Christ, through whom are all things and through whom we exist.

It is not everyone, however, who has this knowledge. Since some have become so accustomed to idols until now, they still think of the food they eat as food offered to an idol; and their conscience, being weak, is defiled. "Food will not bring us close to God." We are no worse off if we do not eat, and no better off if we do. But take care that this liberty of yours does not somehow become a stumbling block to the weak. For if others see you, who possess knowledge, eating in the temple of an idol, might they not, since their conscience is weak, be encouraged to the point of eating food sacrificed to idols? So by your knowledge those weak believers for whom Christ died are destroyed. But when you thus sin against members of your family, and wound their conscience when it is weak, you sin against Christ. Therefore, if food is a cause of their falling, I will never eat meat, so that I may not cause one of them to fall.

Anti-Racism Opportunities

Lent / Black History Month:

Sacred Ground and The Race Card Project

Lent is a time of turning away from sin and back to God. As part of both the penitence of Lent and February's Black History month, the Antiracism Team has planned two projects: 1) The Race Card project; and 2) Making a U-Turn: Learn About Sacred Ground

The Race Card Project (end of January and February)

The Race Card project, a fascinating exploration of race and identity, was developed by journalist Michele Norris in 2010. She asked people around the world to share their experiences and ideas about identity – in just six words – as the starting point for conversations about race. For questions, contact Kate Lauderbaugh (klauderbaugh@gmail.com) or Kristin Jacobsen (kejcat@gmail.com).

The project has archived more than 500,000 stories and has been used by hundreds of schools, businesses, churches, museums, and even the Justice Department and the U.S. military to foster dialogue and deep examination of how racial dynamics work in institutions.

In partnership with NPR, Norris produced a series of radio segments based on Race Card Project narratives that were honored with a Peabody Award. She is also author of *The Grace of Silence*, a book that includes some of these stories and examines how hidden narratives around race can have a profound and lasting impact.

We'd like your help to gather our own Race Cards throughout the month of February, which is Black History Month.

Think about 6 words that reflect your experiences, questions, hopes, dreams, laments, and observations about race. What shapes your identity?

Each week, we'll physically post responses (retyped and anonymous) on a poster at the back of the church, and we'll select a few for the eblast and Sunday bulletin. We'll use St. Matthew's responses as a starting point for conversations about race, and we may also (with the permission of the author) submit them to the Race Card website to contribute to the national conversation.

Look for more information to come and start thinking about your 6 words!

- segregation should not determine our future

Considered the first French operetta, *The Chalet* was written in 1834 by the composer of the enduring ballet *Giselle* and the dramatic carol *O Holy Night*. The opera tells the story of a young Swiss farmer, in love with the attractive lady owner of a chalet, who spurns his love until her brother returns from 15 years in the Swiss army, and unites the would-be couple with a harmless deception. It will be performed in a new English adaptation for the first time.

St. Matthew's own Francis Lynch wrote *The Boor* in 2023 and based the libretto on an early one-act farce by Anton Chekhov, in which the grieving widow of a landowner in Imperial Russia receives a visit from a brash, loud-mouthed creditor who wants to collect on a debt owed by her late husband. When she defiantly refuses to pay at once, an argument ensues and he comes to realize that he has met his match, in more ways than one. These will be the first performances of the work.
