

ST. MATTHEW'S LAND ACKNOWLEDGEMENT

St. Matthew's Episcopal Church sits on the traditional homelands of the people of the Council of Three Fires: the Ojibwe, Potawatomi, and Odawa nations. This land was also a place of travel and trade to many other tribes, including the Menominee, Ho-Chunk, and Miami tribes. These Native Peoples were forced off their lands with the Second Treaty of Prairie du Chien in 1829. After a series of land transfers, St. Matthew's acquired its current site within this territory in 1906. Today, Cook County is home to tens of thousands of Native Americans from many tribes. We acknowledge and respect our Indigenous neighbors, as we strive to be good stewards of this Native land.

COVID GUIDELINES

Our Covid protocols have eased, but the number of cases has begun to rise again. Please be attentive to the following:

- Masks are optional in the building and at our services. Please respect the choices others

 - Before services begin, the windows are opened and fans run, creating substantial air flow.
- Medical grade N95 masks are available upon request from our ushers.
- At Communion
 - o Before beginning the Eucharistic Prayer, the clergy sanitize their hands.
 - Wine at communion: Communion ministers will be off to the side offering a chalice and an intinction bowl. We ask you decide either to drink from the chalice, instinct the wafer (dip the wafer into the wine) using the bowl, or forgo the wine.

A READING FROM EXODUS (3:7-12).






TEMPORARY CHANGE IN OFFICE HOURS



Cold weather update: Due to the frigid temperatures forecasted for Walk day, we will offer a short around the block walk instead of a 2-mile walk. Be part of the family-friendly Walk for Warmth on January 15, 2024 in honor of Martin Luther King Jr.'s Day of Service. Join us in the fight against homelessness in our community. *There is no charge to register for the walk, but advance registration is required.* The short walk through central Evanston starts at about 11 AM at First United Methodist Church at 516 Church St. in downtown Evanston. Join us for a brief program in the sanctuary at 10:50 AM. Sanctuary doors (on Hinman) open at 10:30 AM. The Walk concludes no later than 12:00 PM at First United Methodist Church. If you do not wish to walk, you are welcome to remain in the sanctuary and "walk in spirit" with the walkers.

Court Watch Volunteer Program

Court Watch is a volunteer program founded in 2007 to observe and bear witness at detained immigrants' hearings in Chicago. While Illinois passed legislation that banned immigrant detention within our state beginning in 2022, deportation cases are still processed in the Chicago Immigration Court nearly every weekday for immigrants - including Illinois residents - who are jailed in Wisconsin, Indiana, Kentucky, and other states. Can you volunteer a few hours a month to stand with detained immigrants? Court Watch volunteers attend as many of these hearings as possible (most hearings are currently conducted online via Webex). We partner with legal organizations and pro bono attorneys, highlighting problems we observe and cases where unrepresented detainees are in need of legal help.
