St. Matthew's Episcopal Church sits on the traditional homelands of the people of the Council of Three Fires: the Ojibwe, Potawatomi, and Odawa nations. This land was also a place of travel and trade to many other tribes, including the Menominee, Ho-Chunk, and Miami tribes. These Native Peoples were forced off their lands with the Second Treaty of Prairie du Chien in 1829. After a series of land transfers, St. Matthew's acquired its current site within this territory in 1906. Today, Cook County is home to tens of thousands of Native Americans from many tribes. We acknowledge and respect our Indigenous neighbors, as we strive to be good stewards of this Native land.







### THE HOLY GOSPEL OF OUR SAVIOR JESUS CHRIST ACCORDING TO MATTHEW

(1:18-25)

People Glory to you, O Christ.

Now the birth of Jesus the Messiah took place in this way. When his mother Mary had been engaged to Joseph, but before they lived together, she was found to be with child from the Holy Spirit. Her husband Joseph, being a righteous man and unwilling to expose her to public disgrace, planned to dismiss her quietly. But just when he had resolved to do this, an angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream and said, "Joseph, son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary as your wife, for the child conceived in her is from the Holy Spirit. She will bear a son, and you are to name him Jesus, for he will save his people from their sins." All this took place to fulfill what had been spoken by the Lord through the prophet:

"Look, the virgin shall conceive and bear a son, and they shall name him Emmanuel,"

which means, "God is with us." When Joseph awoke from sleep, he did as the angel of the Lord commanded him; he took her as his wife, but had no marital relations with her until she had borne a son; and he named him Jesus.

THE OFFERTORY ANTHEM The cherry tree carol (On Christmas night) arr. Bob Chilcott

Joseph was an old man, and an old man was he, when he wedded Mary in the land of Galilee. Joseph and Mary walk'd through an orchard good, where was cherries and berries so red as any blood. O then bespoke Mary, so meek and so mild, 'Pluck me one cherry, Joseph, for I am with child.' "Go to the tree, Mary, And it shall bow to thee, And the highest branch of all shall bow down to Mary's knee. Then bow'd down the tallest tree, it bent to Mary's hand: Then she cried, 'See, Joseph, I have cherries at command!' 'O eat your cherries, Mary, o eat your cherries now; o eat your cherries, Mary, that grow upon the bough.' Then Mary pluck'd a cherry as red as the blood; then Mary went home with her heavy load.

This carol comes from the Middle Ages probably from a "mystery play" where biblical stories were enacted during Advent and Christmas. The story deals with Joseph's doubt and his eventual "redemption."

Sanctify us also that we may faithfully receive this holy Sacrament, and serve you in unity, constancy, and peace; and at the last day bring us with Matthew and all your saints into the joy of your eternal kingdom. All this we ask through our Savior Jesus Christ: By him, and with him, and in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit all honor and glory is yours, Almighty Father, now and forever.

Late in Stravinsky's life, he returned to the Russian Orthodox Church. While it was first set in Russian, he later adapted it (when he moved to Hollywood) and set in Latin adding an Amen at the end. We have this piece of music because Nadia Boulenger, the great pianist and music educator, saved the manuscript and promoted the piece in the choral concerts she conducted until she died in 1979.

# Anti-Racism / Loving Our Neighbor
